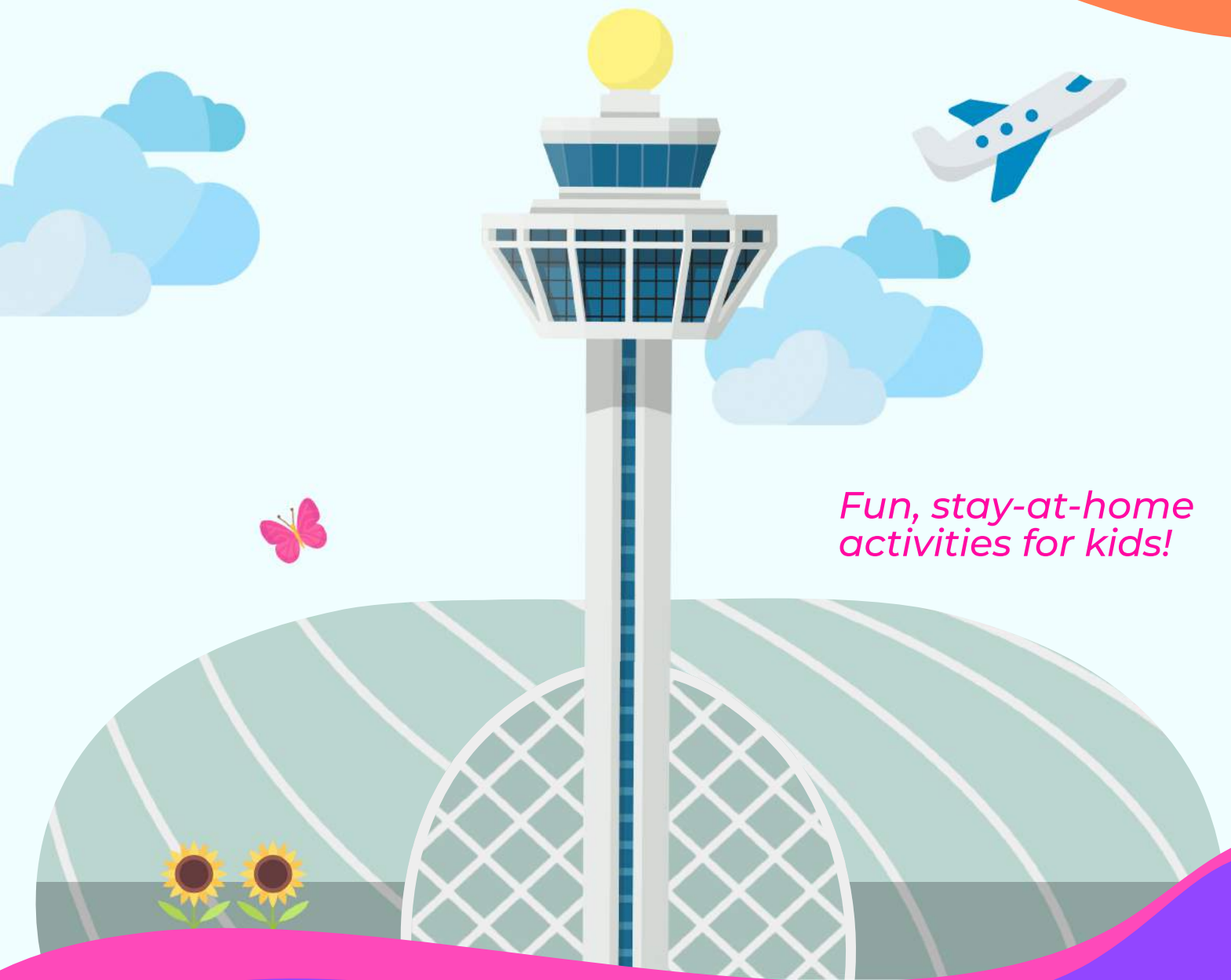

# COLOUR YOUR OWN BUTTERFLY GARDEN



## Did you know?

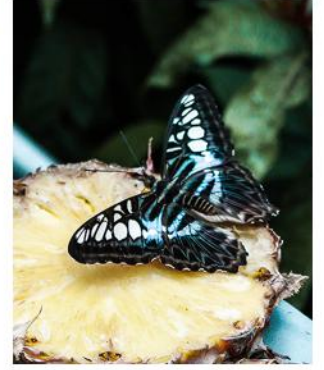
Ripe pineapples and red gerbera flowers (or daisies) in Changi's butterfly garden are covered in a honey mixture for butterflies to feed on.

Forest butterflies feast on pineapples, while the more vibrant-coloured butterflies are drawn to honey for nectar.

Changi also has its very own butterfly, the Common Rose Butterfly, *Pachliopta aristolochiae asteris*. Try to keep a look out for it the next time you're there!

# COLOUR YOUR OWN CACTUS GARDEN



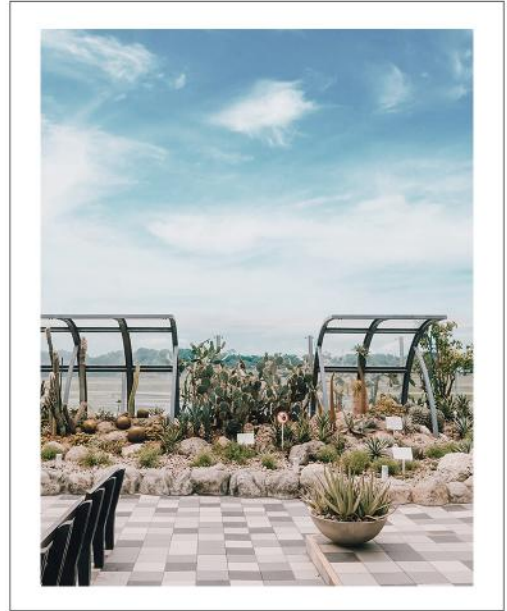
## Did you know?

Many cacti at Changi Airport are edible and have medicinal benefits.

Some species of *Opuntia*, such as the *Prickly Pear Cactus*, have yummy stems and fruit that can be eaten raw or cooked. They can even be used to make candy and jam!

The juice from the plant is also used as medicine to treat diabetes and heal wounds.

Do remember to be careful when you visit our Cactus Garden. Many cacti have pricks which may injure you!

# COLOUR YOUR OWN SUNFLOWER GARDEN



## *Did you know?*

All sunflowers at the Sunflower Garden are grown from seeds in Changi Airport's very own nursery. Each plant takes between 60 and 90 days to grow, before they are planted in the garden.

Sunflowers are not single flowers, but a combination of more than 3,000 mini flowers called a capitulum!

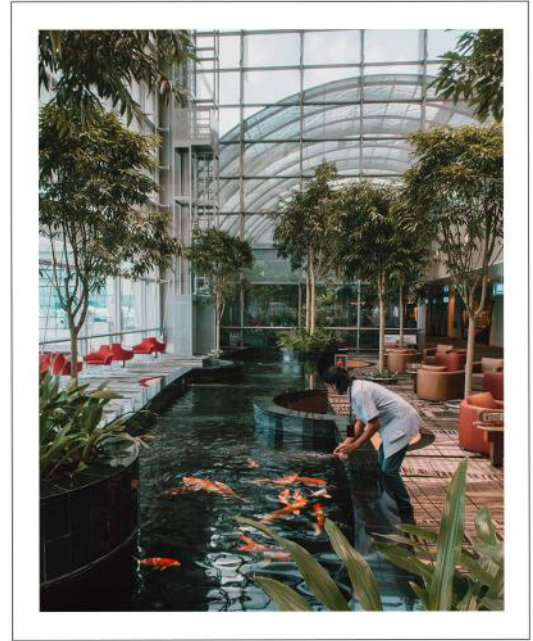

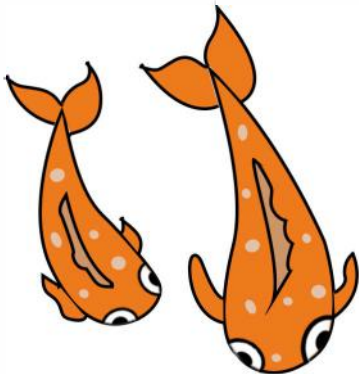
## Did you know?

The oldest koi fish in the world was from Japan, named Hanako. She was 226 years old - that's older than any human being has ever lived!

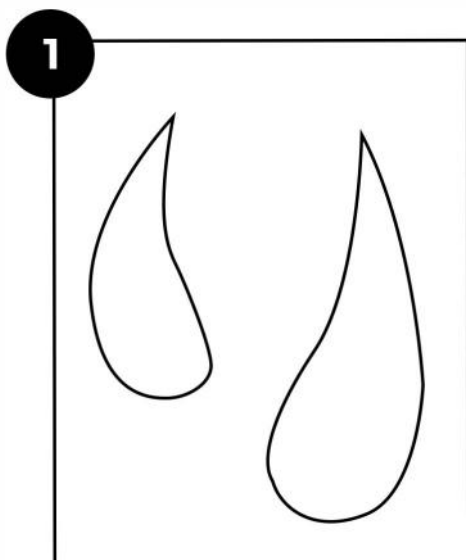

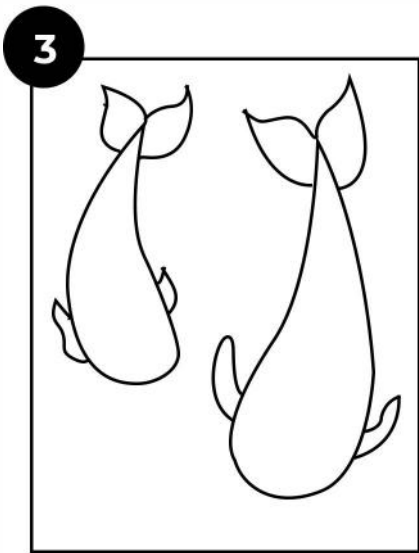

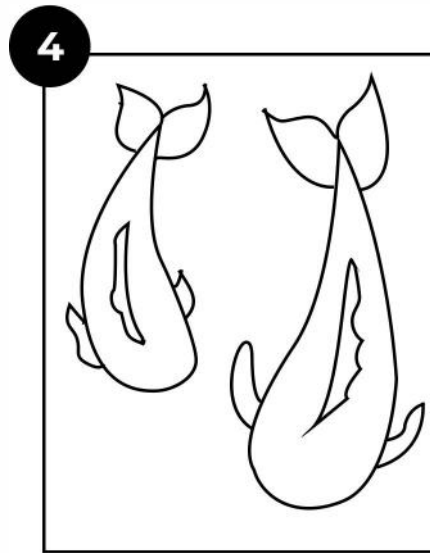
Draw the Koi's body



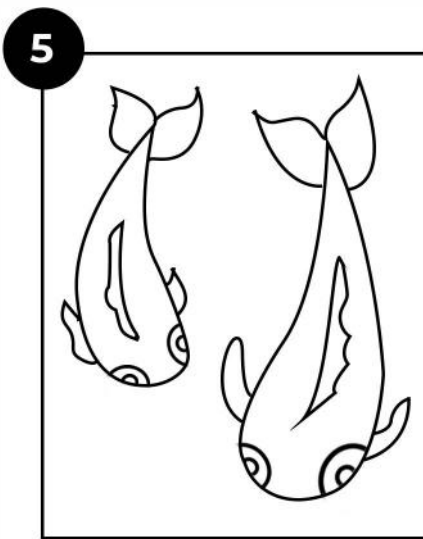
Draw the tail fins



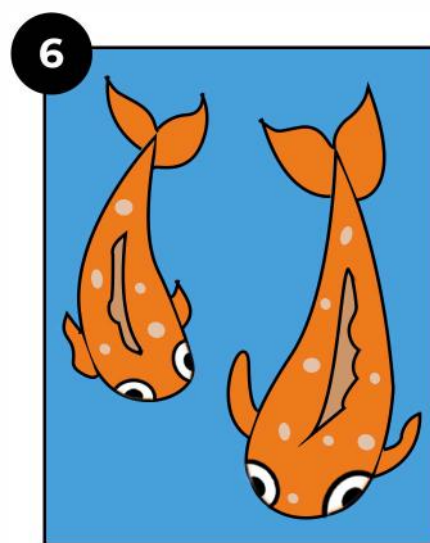
Draw the pelvic fins

Draw eyes for your fishes!



Colour in your koi fish any way you like!

**Tail Fins**  
Helps the fish to move through water, pick up speed and make turns

**Pelvic Fins**  
Helps the fish to balance, prevents it from moving side to side

**Eyes**  
Fish have similar eyes to humans, with an extra film over their eyes that helps them to see underwater!

**Dorsal Fins**  
Helps the fish to make sudden turns and stops it from rolling

## Fun Fact:

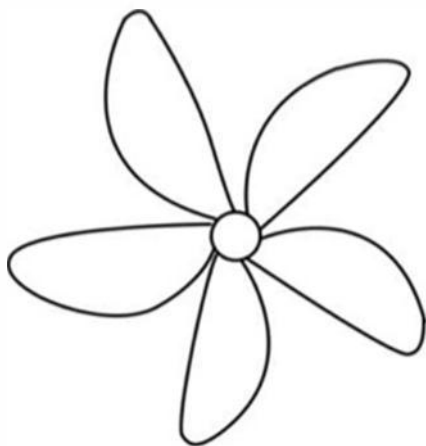
Daisy in Changi was specially painted in red and white to represent Singapore's national colours. It also turns when visitors walk past it.

The next time you are there, try walking near it and see if it responds to you!



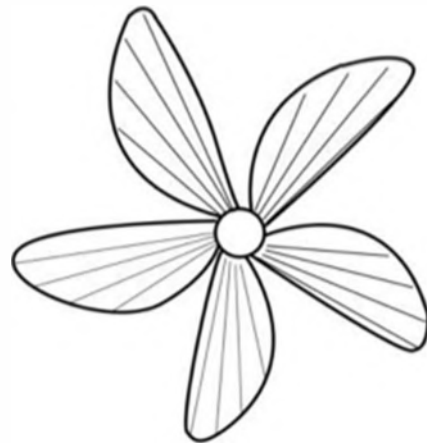

Draw the daisy by drawing a circle (pistil) and 5 semicircles (petals) around it

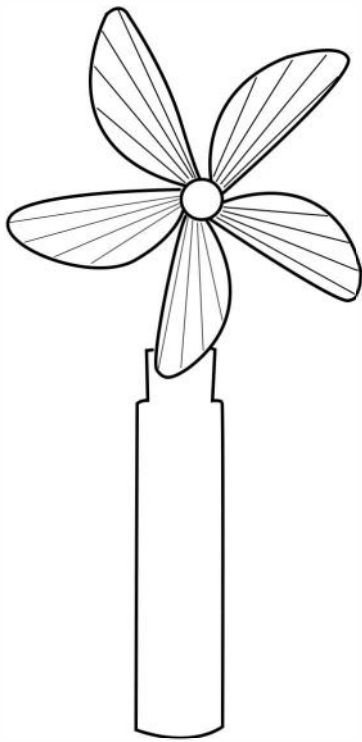

Add detail to your daisy with some lines (petal veins)

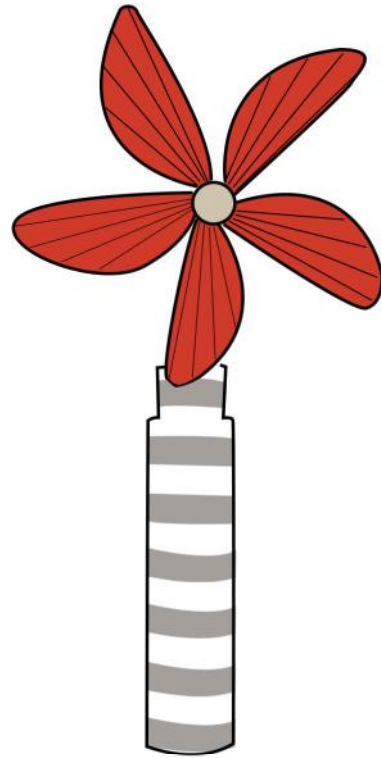

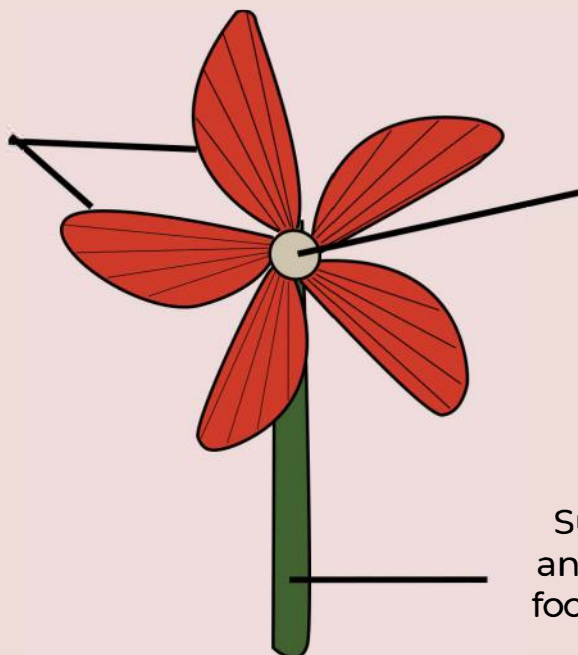
3. Give your daisy some support by drawing a pole below it

**Petal**  
Usually bright coloured to attract insects



**Pistil**  
Contains the eggs (*ovules*) that allow a flower to reproduce

**Stem**  
Supports the flower and helps to transport food and water as well!

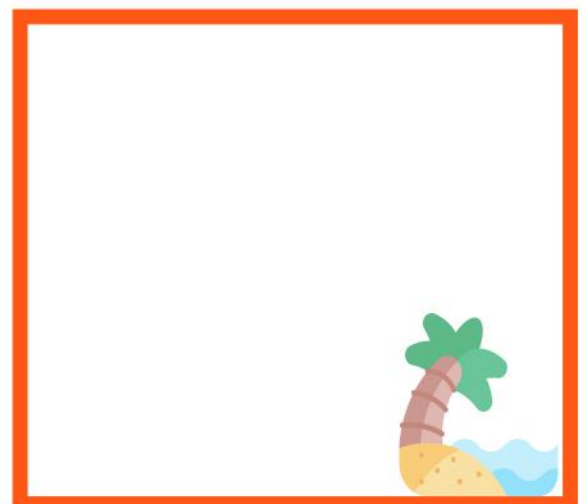
# COLOUR THE ROUTE

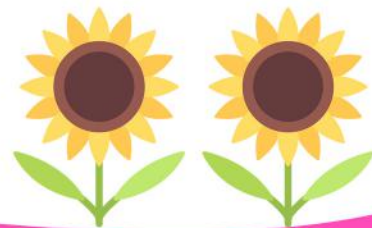

# SPOT THE ERROR

## Answer Key



### *Did you know?*

**1L Water Bottle:** Liquids, aerosols or gels which are in containers larger than 100ml are not allowed on your hand carry luggage

**Peanut Butter:** Jams and spreads are considered liquids. If your jar is above 100ml, you will not be able to bring it with you!

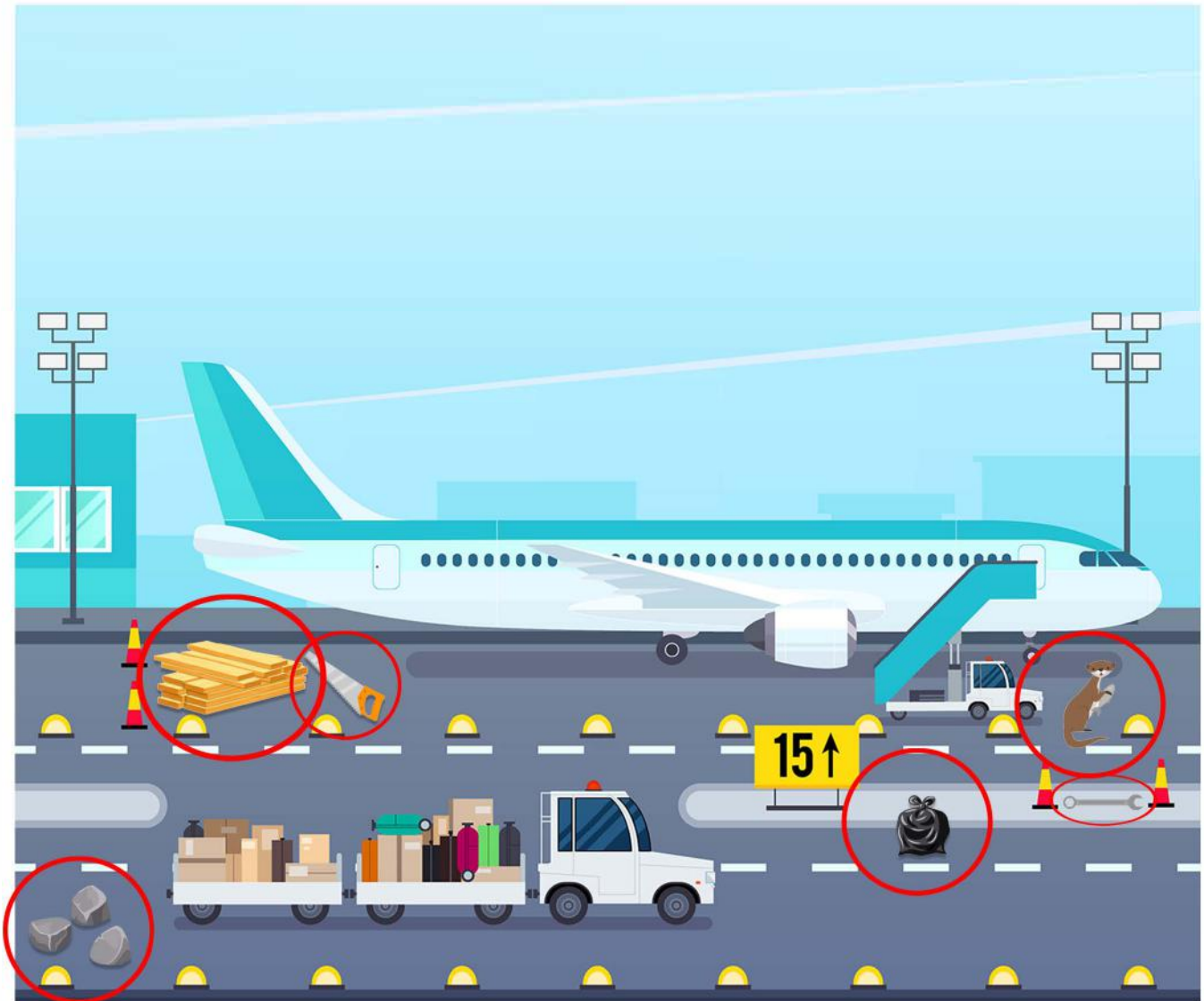
**Scissors:** Scissors with sharp blades will be confiscated.

**Bananas and apples:** Food produce is not allowed if you are travelling to countries like Australia and New Zealand!
